

CCWVA ASSISTS WITH FOOD PANTRY OPENING IN RICHWOOD

The disastrous flooding of 2016 devastated the small town of Richwood, WV. Father Quay Dang of Holy Family Catholic Parish in Richwood immediately began reaching out to establish a food pantry through their church. The only food pantry in the area was destroyed by the flood and the need was immediate.

Through a collaborative effort of Father Quay, the parish members of the Holy Family Parish, St. James Catholic Church of Charles Town, Catholic Charities West Virginia (CCWVa) and the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, the pantry was able to officially open its doors just before Thanksgiving. The shelves had been stocked with nonperishable items through many flood donation collections, and St. James was able to provide turkeys for the families coming in November.



The pantry is now open on the 3rd Tuesday of each month. Volunteers from the church have been able to serve the clients needing assistance.

“We are currently working on getting the church set up with the Mountaineer Food Bank to help ease the burden of expense,” said Tina Cogar, CCWVa Outreach Coordinator. Cogar expects the paperwork to be completed in the near future.

The pantry allows individuals to choose or “shop” for their own food choices. A volunteer directs the family through the pantry, telling them how many items they can choose from each section. RACE FOR HOPE TO BE HELD

Catholic Charities West Virginia (CCWVa) will have our 7th Annual Race for Hope Half Marathon and 5K Run/Walk on Saturday, May 13th this year. The race has been an annual fundraiser for the Elkins office of CCWVa for the past 7 years. One of the main goals for starting this race was to encourage healthy living in our community.

The race takes place on the Allegheny Highlands Bike Trail north of Elkins, WV. It starts at the Leading Creek Fire Department in Kerens, WV, with the half marathon runners following the bike trail north towards Parsons and the 5K runners/walkers following the bike trail south towards Elkins. The course consists of smooth finely crushed stone surface. The race will start and finish at the Leading Creek Fire Department.

All racers who have pre-registered by May 5th will receive a free t-shirt. Children 12 and under are free of charge and will also receive a free t-shirt if registered by May 5th. All proceeds benefit CCWVa's Elkins Outreach Office. On-site registration will be from 8:30 am - 9:30 am at the Leading Creek Fire Department. Those who are unable to attend the race may participate in the Virtual Race for Hope. Registration for the virtual race is available online as well.

And when CCWVa needed some extra items for the flood victims of the Mountain State, the knights were there with assistance and donations. They have also annually sponsored and assisted with the Race for Hope fundraiser.

The Knights of Columbus is the largest Catholic men’s fraternal family organization in the world. The Elkins Council said they are pleased to be assisting CCWVa in helping those in our community through the principle of Catholic charity.
